OHuddle mentors are trained to support students with the "40 Developmental Assets," research-based practice to foster positive youth outcomes. Students; nominated by schools, meet with their mentor for 40 minutes weekly; but are also supported regularly by their Site Coordinators, who serve in their schools daily. Service Coordinator opportunities and progress monitoring ensure individualized programming for each student served.






